Life in Saskatchewan for international students is known to be quite enriching and full of opportunities. Below you will find some useful information about life in Saskatchewan, here are some links as well <u>Interesting and Fun Facts About Saskatchewan</u> and <u>About Saskatchewan</u>.

Saskatchewan Climate

Saskatchewan is a land where each season has its own special charms. Here's a glimpse into the beauty of Saskatchewan's land and sky: <u>Starry Night - YouTube</u>

Autumn begins in mid-September with warm, sunny days that give way to cool, crisp nights with huge harvest moons. City and countryside erupt in a glorious display of colour. Temperatures range between a low of -9 degrees Celsius at night to highs of +19 degrees C during the day (on average).

When winter begins in mid-November, the days are generally sunny, the snow dry and powdery. Our coldest days are often our most beautiful days, with sun dogs blazing in the sky and frost shining on every surface. Often on winter nights the dancing Northern Lights appear. Temperatures range between highs of 0 degrees C during the day to lows of -24 degrees C during the night (on average).

Spring explodes with new growth around mid-March. As the days and nights get warmer, yards turn green, gardens flourish, flowers bloom and farm fields burst into colour. Temperatures range between lows of -13 degrees C at night to highs of +15 degrees C during the day (on average).

Summer is hot, with sunny days and warm nights. Parks, beaches and backyards are full. Families go to the many summer fairs and festivals, or just get in the car and explore the countryside, where oceans of flowering crops of green, yellow and purple can be seen rippling in the breeze. July and August are the warmest months of the year with temperatures ranging between +15 degrees C during the night to +25 degrees C during the day (on average).

The <u>Saskatchewan Immigration website</u> has a lot of valuable information regarding appropriate dress for the winter. You'll find the weather is a common topic of conversation in Canada – we have a lot of weather changes so there is a lot to talk about! Saskatchewan Lifestyle

According to the United Nations' Human Development Index, Canada is one of the best countries in the world in which to live due to our strong social safety net and enthusiastic support of education for all. According to the same criteria, Saskatchewan is the best place to reside in Canada based on quality of life. The province is known for its safe and friendly communities, and the cost of living is competitive. You'll find that the natural beauty of the prairies, lakes, and communities contributes to a high quality of life.

Canadian society is built on an open, democratic system of government and a justice system designed to protect the individual and prevent the violence and persecution that is too often seen in other countries. The police and courts are subject to regulations and public scrutiny that guarantee fairness and protection for all residents. The integrity of the RCMP, Canada's national police force, is recognized throughout the world. In fact, the RCMP has been used as a model for police forces around the globe.

Family

Childcare

We have more museums per capita than anywhere else in Canada, including the Royal Saskatchewan Museum and the world-famous RCMP Heritage Centre, both located in Regina. We also have many smaller community museums, such as the Eastend Fossil Research Station near where "Scotty," one of the world's most complete Tyrannosaurus Rex skeletons, was discovered.

For the adventurous, Saskatchewan has some of the best sport fishing and wilderness canoeing in the world. There are more than 100,000 freshwater lakes in our province that make great getaways. During the winter months, skating, cross-country skiing and snowmobiling are popular.

Saskatchewan's cities are graced by urban parks such as Meewasin Valley in Saskatoon, Wakamow Valley in Moose Jaw, and Regina's Wascana Centre, one of the largest urban parks in the world. Adapting to Life in Saskatchewan and Canada

Culture shock

• Coming from a country which has a different culture, language and customs can be a disorienting experience. Culture shock can be experienced in a number of ways. For example, after the excitement of the first few weeks, you may find yourself feeling a bit lonely, sad or confused. This is a natural response. With friends and family no longer available, you will have to find new ways of doing things, different ways of communicating with people, and alternate ways of learning in the classroom. This can be a very stressful time. While one student may experience culture shock by being extremely lonely or homesick, another student may experience it through physical symptoms such as headaches, upset stomach, insomnia or an inability to concentrate. Symptoms can range from feeling sad and low to a more severe depression. You may be aware of these feelings in the first few weeks, or the reaction may be delayed.

Dry skin

• Frequent showers plus the dry air in heated apartments during the winter can cause the skin to become extremely dry. A general remedy is to use a moisturizing lotion or baby oil on your skin. When in doubt, seek medical help. Try to increase the humidity in the apartment by buying a humidifier or simply by filling a container with water every few days and placing it in the bedroom. We hope these hints will be helpful as you and your body adjust to a different climate.

Fitting in

Although Canada is billed as a multicultural country, there are social norms that are generally accepted no

Making friends

- Loneliness is one of the most worrisome feelings reported by international students and making new friends is the best remedy for dealing with this problem. Make a special effort to reach out and meet people. Personal and social contacts are vital to your well-being and your adjustment here.
- One of the easiest ways to meet people is by joining clubs or associations, in the classroom or by working on projects together. It's up to you to say, "Hello!" Cross-cultural interactions are extremely rewarding and will definitely enhance your self-esteem and your sense of identity.
- If you experience any adjustment difficulties during your time here, please come and see us. We understand how difficult it can be for some students and we can provide you with a great deal of support. Our services are confidential.

First Things to Do in Saskatchewan

Moving to a new country can be both exciting and stressful. When you first move to Saskatchewan, there are a number of things you'll need to do to settle as quickly as possible. The list below serves as a guide to help you as a newcomer in Saskatchewan:

- Find a place to live
- Apply for a <u>Social Insurance Number (SIN)</u>
- Apply for a <u>Saskatchewan Health Services Card</u>
- Get a map of your community and learn about <u>public transportation</u> and find other community resources
- Open a bank account
- Contact your <u>Regional Newcomer Gateway</u> to find out about:
 - English language classes (if needed)
 - Employment services
 - Other services and community resources
- Register your children in school
- Find the nearest doctor, clinic or hospital
- Get a driver's license
- Get connected with utilities, phone and internet

Healthcare and Medical Insurance

All Saskatchewan residents receive free hospital and medical coverage through Saskatchewan Health Cards.. This includes things like a hospital bed in a public ward and doctor visits. All Saskatchewan residents must register themselves and their dependents for a Saskatchewan Health Card in order to receive health benefits. The Saskatchewan Health card should be presented whenever you need health services.

However, dental services, vision services, and prescription medications are not included in this plan. Southeast College offers an <u>International Emergency Health Insurance Plan (Click for more information)</u> for international students studying in Canada.

Saskatchewan Health Card

Saskatchewan Health Card Saskatchewan Health covers health services for certain special classes of newcomers from outside Canada who move to Saskatchewan on or before the first day of the third calendar month after arriving in Canada. If you are among the groups identified below, you may be eligible for benefits from the day you move to Saskatchewan.

- permanent residents (landed immigrants)
- people discharged from the Canadian Forces
- non-immigrants who are in Canada in connection with their trade or profession
- international students
- returning spouses of Canadian Forces members
- returning Canadian citizens
- returning residents

Saskatchewan Health Card International Students

If you are an international student temporarily residing in Saskatchewan to further your education, you may be eligible for Saskatchewan health coverage.

Your application will need to accompany proof of full-time enrolment at an accredited educational institute, as well as a valid Study Permit issued by Immigration, Refugee and Citizenship Canada (IRCC).

Students From Other Provinces

If you are a resident of another Canadian province or territory, and are receiving an education in Saskatchewan, then you should retain coverage with your home province or territory. For more information, contact the Health Registries department in your home province.

Identification

You can get a Saskatchewan Government Insurance (SGI) photo identification (ID) card from any motor license issuer. Two pieces of ID are required to get a photo ID. Both pieces of ID must establish your legal name, signature and birth date. Please visit <u>SGI</u> for information regarding acceptable documents. These documents allow you to prove residency and can assist when you look to purchase mobile phones and other items.

Study Permits

International students must make sure that they are eligible to enter Canada and possess all the required documents. For more information, please visit the <u>Government of Canada's website</u> to find out if you need a Study Permit or how to apply for one. In order to apply for a study permit you will need to apply for a provincial attestation letter <u>(PAL)</u>.

It is strongly recommended that you submit the study permit application at least three months before the start of classes to allow for processing time.

Work Permits

Some programs have a mandatory clinical practicum component. **A Co-op Work Permit is required.** If you are outside of Canada and applying for your initial study permit, you can apply for your co-op work permit at the same time. This way, both your study permit and your co-op work permit will be processed at the same time.

You may be able to stay and work in Canada after you graduate by getting a <u>post-graduation work permit</u> (<u>PGWP</u>). PGWP eligibility depends on several requirements, including when you submit your study permit application. Employment in Canada

Co-operative Education

- Co-operative Education consists of a three-way partnership between students, Southeast College and employers.
- When applying for your study permit, if you are in one of the co-op programs, you should apply for your coop work permit at the same time as your study permit. If you failed to do this, you should apply for the coop work permit as soon as possible.

Off Campus

As an international student, you are permitted to work off campus up to 24 hours per week without a work permit once your studies begin. You must be a full-time student with a valid study permit. Also, you must be taking a program that is a least six months long that leads to a certificate, diploma or degree. You can work up to 24 hours per week during regular academic sessions and full-time during scheduled breaks. Make sure you meet the other requirements for working while you study.

Post-Graduation

• Students studying certificate, diploma or degree programs that are at least eight months in length may be eligible to work after graduation. You need to apply for a <u>post-graduation work permit</u>.

Spouse or Common-law Partner

• There may also be options for the spouse or common-law partner of a full-time student to work. Please visit <u>IRCC</u> for more information.

Student Employment Services

- Southeast College students and graduates are highly sought after by employers. With nearly a third of Canada's labour force set to retire in the next five to ten years, employers are actively searching for quality employees to fill vacancies left by retirees, and to provide new skills for evolving industries and their technologies.

- We additionally bring in various employers and companies to talk to our students and host an annual career fair.

Taxes

- Every year Canadians and most international students complete Federal and Provincial Income Tax forms and apply for a GST and PST tax credit. Workshops are offered every year in March and are intended to help you complete an income tax return.
- The <u>Federal Government</u> website has more information on taxes. They also have a series of very informative <u>videos</u> that you should consider viewing during tax time.

Income Tax

Students in Canada should submit an income tax return annually to claim a tuition tax credit. The deadline for filing these claims is the end of April. International students working on, or off campus may also need to complete an income tax return.

- International students are permitted and encouraged to complete a federal (Canada) income tax return whether they have worked or not. Employment income, scholarships, bursaries and fellowships are normally subject to income tax.
- Provincial and federal income taxes are deducted from your salary on every pay cheque. Income tax may be
 refunded depending on your annual income and expenses. Every year you will be required to file an income
 tax return before the end of April. To assist you in completing the income tax return, Canada Revenue
 Agency publishes a <u>Students and Income Tax Booklet</u>. International Education will arrange for a workshop
 on this topic.
- Please review information regarding Federal and Provincial taxes.

Students will receive an email from the ministry with their code to download their T2202 tax form. If you would like to know more about T2202 please review here: 2024 T2202 Information | Southeast College. Southeast College will communicate about T2202 in January-February each year

Get a Bank Account

You will need the following things to set up a bank account:

- passport
- local address
- student card (prior to getting a student card, show your letter of admission).

One of the first things you should do when you arrive in Saskatoon is to deposit your money in a bank. It is not wise to carry large amounts of money with you or to keep it where you live. There are ten chartered banks in Canada and there are many locally and nationally based credit unions and trust companies that function much the same as banks.

There are two main types of accounts at banks:

- 1. Chequing accounts which most people use for paying regular bills and for most shopping needs.
- 2. **Savings accounts** which allow you to earn interest on money which you do not need to use.

When you visit a bank, ask about accounts that offer lower service fees for students. Be sure to ask for details concerning all the possible service fees that might apply for monthly service, withdrawing and depositing money, using ATMs at other institutions, writing cheques, banking online, using debit cards, etc. These service fees can add up, so make sure you understand how you will be charged.

Transportation from Airport

The closest international airport to our campuses is located in Regina, Saskatchewan. Once arriving in Regina, transportation will need to be arranged from the airport to the town you plan to reside in, for example, Weyburn, Estevan, or Whitewood. There is not a bus service between the cities.

Driving in Saskatchewan

You will need to have a valid Saskatchewan driver's license to drive in Saskatchewan. The Saskatchewan Immigration website has information on how to arrange for your <u>driver's license</u>.

It is very important that you have spent some time learning about the "rules of the road" in Canada before you start driving. You can learn about this by reading the <u>Saskatchewan Driver's Handbook</u>. For instance, Canada has very strict rules when it comes to drinking, drugs and driving. These rules also do vary from province to province so make yourself aware of the rules of the road before driving in and outside of Saskatchewan.

Transportation Around Town

<u>Understand Rules of Renting in Saskatchewan</u>


Tenant Insurance when renting a home

Renter's (tenant) insurance protects your belongings and covers personal liability while living in a rental unit in Saskatchewan. It's not legally required, but many landlords require it as part of the lease.

What it covers:

- Personal belongings (e.g., clothes, electronics, furniture) against theft, fire, and water damage
- Liability if someone is injured in your unit or if you accidentally cause damage (e.g., flooding the unit below)
- Temporary living costs if your rental becomes unlivable due to a covered event
- Identity theft

You can get Tenant Insurance through insurance companies like <u>SGI</u> for example.



Notably, housing in Saskatchewan is more affordable and Saskatchewan has a higher homeowner rate compared to other provinces in Canada.

Welcome to Estevan! Estevan, the closest city to the United States border of the prairie provinces, is located in the southeast corner of the province nestled along the Souris River. As of the 2016 census, city had a population of 13,615.

Estevan is known as a mining, oil and power generating city with a very strong entrepreneurial spirit. Estevan is home to a number of excellent recreational and educational facilities and great pride is taken in ensuring a positive community growth agenda, making Estevan a great place to live, work and do business. Take in the boutique stores of downtown or the "must see" rocks of Roche Percee.

Estevan is the eighth largest and most southern city in Saskatchewan, located in Western Canada. It is located approximately 16 km north of the Canada-United States (North Dakota) border. Estevan is located on the main north-south rail line that provides benefits of tremendous access to the North American market. It is a vibrant and growing community in Southeast Saskatchewan. Estevan is the commercial hub of the Southeast. With its central location, and excellent transportation system (highways, rail, air), Estevan is well connected with markets throughout North America. Three major highways, as well as, the main CPR line pass directly through the city providing access to both east-west and north-south corridors. The Estevan airport accommodates charter flights and has the potential for further development.

The city is surrounded by the Rural Municipality of Estevan No. 5. Estevan has a humid continental climate characterized by cold, long and dry winters and warm, short and relatively humid summers. It is the Sunshine Capital of Canada with an annual average of 3,536.6 hours of sunshine and also has the highest annual number of hours per year with clear skies in the country.

Referred to as "The Opportunity City" in 2019, Weyburn was ranked as Best Place to Live in the Prairies and 45th overall in Canada by Maclean's Magazine. Weyburn's vibrant economy has created opportunities for people from all over the world to visit, live, study and do business. As of the 2016 census, city had a population of 10,870.

As one of the fastest growing communities in Saskatchewan, Weyburn is recognized as one of the more desirable places to live and work. 








